The culture iceberg



Explicit culture: conscious, easier to change, visible – eg. literature; art; clothing; dance; music

Implicit culture: unconscious, more difficult to change, opaque – eg. beliefs; values; concept of authority; views of time, nature, community & self; decision-making process

Comparing cultures: Hofstede

Geert Hofstede, *Culture's Consequences* (Sage, 2001):

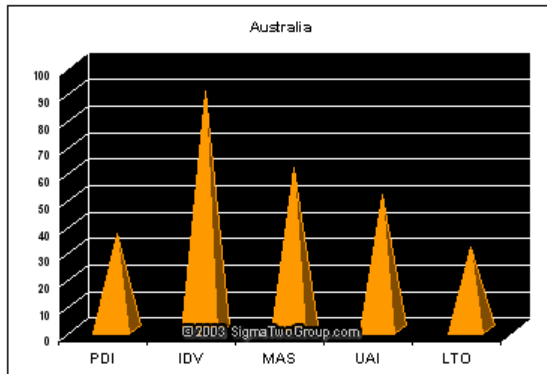
- Power distance (acceptance of unequal power, hierarchy)
- Uncertainty avoidance (acceptance of ambiguity)
- Individualism and collectivism (self v groups)
- Masculinity and femininity (things, success v care for life)
- Long term orientation (short term v long term views)

“Culture is more often a source of conflict than of synergy. Cultural differences are a nuisance at best and often a disaster.”

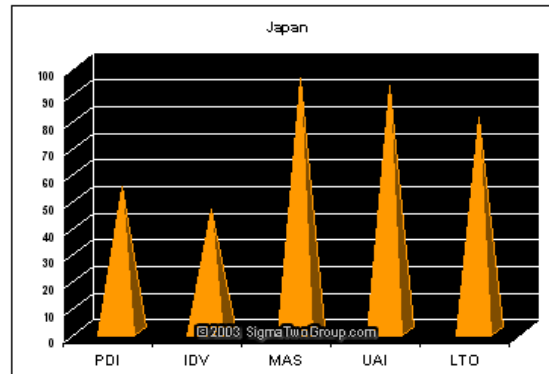

Hofstede's scores

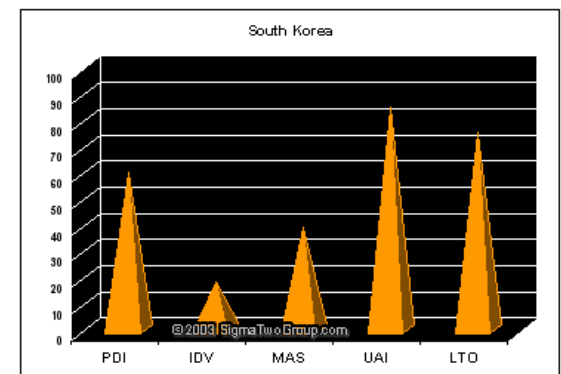

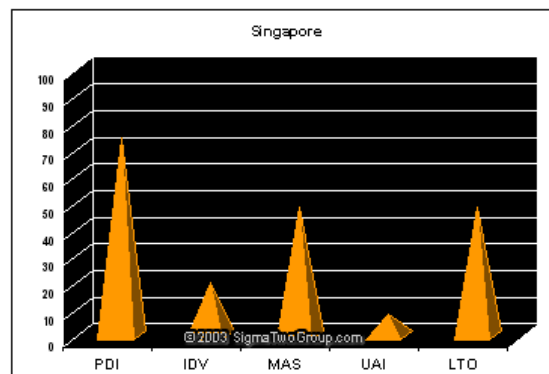

Universalism	Particularism
Individualism	Communitarianism
Specificity	Diffusion
Achieved status	Ascribed status
Inner directed	Outer directed
Sequential time	Synchronous time

A cautionary note

Generalisation	Stereotype
Does not apply to everyone in every situation	Deemed applicable to everyone in every situation
Just a “first guess”	A rigid impression
Subject to a normal “bell curve”	Everyone is in the same box
Discarded when no longer accurate	Retained even though no longer accurate
